THE HISTORIC HOUSE OF HEELTOP

Every once in a great while, a magical opportunity almost too good to be true presents itself. Such is the case with the offering of the House of Heeltop, an enchanting jazz-age dwelling at 3 Ridge Rd. in Chapel Hill. Built in 1928 by John Nathaniel Couch, the respected UNC-Chapel Hill botany professor and renowned mycologist, Heeltop earned its name due to its perch on the highest single-family residential point in Chapel Hill, adjacent to Tarheel terrain.

A canopy of ancient oak trees

encircling Heeltop provides a sense of tranquility and seclusion, making it hard to believe that this 1.5-acre private sanctuary is close to the very best of Blue Heaven ... The UNC School of Law is across the road, Boshamer and Kenan stadiums are within easy walking distance, and Heeltop's kitchen window allows sights and sounds of UNC Bell Tower. Add in Heel-

top's lush landscaping, a gurgling waterfall flowing into a serenely picturesque pond and unique rock outcroppings, and it's understandable that you may be transported into the setting of a storybook. The House of Heeltop and its verdant surroundings are magical, delightful, enthralling.

Purchased in 2002 by UNC alumnus Stephen Davis, Heeltop has been treasured by the Davis family. Upon his recent decision to spend the autumn of his life in his mountain home, Heeltop has undergone a whole house renovation by Stephen's daughter, Chapel Hill-based builder Nancy Davis.



Recently renovated and available for sale, the House of Heeltop, built in 1928, will be open for viewing Saturday, May 16, 2 to 5 p.m. To visit, take NC54 West/Raleigh Road in Chapel Hill to left on Country Club Road. Go .08 of a mile and turn right on Ridge Road. The house is on the left.


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
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
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
